
ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN CHURCH

The Roman Catholic world mourns the loss of Francis and celebrates Pope Pious XIV. Politics in the USA continues to polarize the people. Wars in various parts of the world are described as the Third World War in pieces. All these things invite us to ponder, "Who are we? What do we stand for? When Jesus began his ministry, he preached his first sermon. The Scripture he based that sermon on was the prophet Isaiah 61. This first sermon set the tone for his entire ministry. He told us what he stood for; "The Spirit of the Lord God has taken control of me! The Lord has chosen and sent me to tell the oppressed the good news, to heal the brokenhearted, and to announce freedom for prisoners and captives". This, too, is the message we preach. And again it can be summed up in Jesus' words recorded in Mark 12... "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these."

God's allegiance is always with Humanity and Creation. As Christians our first allegiance is always to our gracious God and the Kingdom God established through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. Everything we think, profess and do is shaped by those core values as expressed in Scriptures quoted above. It is our Lutheran belief that God has established various agencies to ensure that all people (especially the ones mentioned in Jesus' first sermon) are well cared for. Those agencies we call Government, law enforcement, courts etc. These people work on behalf of God to ensure that all people are protected and cared for. As Christians we do not worship these agencies. These agencies are intended by God to implement the vision expressed by Jesus. They are meant to set us free to love our neighbor as ourselves. These agencies exist to serve God, not the other way around!

So my siblings in Jesus I ask **"What do you stand for? Who do you serve?"** We live in a world where it is imperative that we know what we believe and how to put those beliefs into actions and words. Jesus' love for, and inclusion of, all people eventually got him killed. **Love can be that threatening to those who seek power for their own benefit**. It's imperative we know what we stand for. Our lives and the lives of all people around us depend on us knowing what we stand for. For me, Micah 6:8 sums up what I stand for. *"Act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God"*. What do you stand for?

The Plenty4All Coops have all planted the seeds which were recently purchased and are seeing good progress. Jackline Miriti the Project Manager in Lumuruti was pleased to share photos of healthy good looking crops which they planted.

In Ndhiwa, Kenya Pollycap Ogalo, CEO of Plenty4All, is making good progress recovering from his back injury. He has been able to take a class on the use of the EcoFlow Delta 2 Max solar charger and 160 W solar panel which we just purchased. This solar electric system produces and stores enough power to operate almost any electronic equipment and tools. Pollycap and his family can now enjoy fans, cook rice, vegetables and fish using an electric rice cooker instead of an open fire. We will use it with electric tools to build the interior of the Guest and Training Center.

After drawing up sketches of the Plenty4All Guest and Training Center I asked a friend to look them over and offer suggestions for the electrical and plumbing systems as this is his profession. He advised me and drew the systems to scale. They were sent to Pollycap who provided them to the local contractor to ensure the building standards and regulations were met.

After the plans were approved, we have begun building and will soon have the first phase of

construction completed. The foundation has been dug and then filled with rocks and concrete and the brick walls are going up now. Soon the roof will go on and the next phase of construction will be to raise funds for the rainwater collection and storage system. After that the interior construction can take place.



HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW OUR NEIGHBORS?



The 43604 ZIP code represents the heart of downtown Toledo, Ohio, a region rich in history and culture currently undergoing revitalization. The Huron Street corridor from the Mud Hens stadium to Adams Street is scheduled for extensive renovations in the next three years, just outside our doorstep! In addition to key landmarks like Fifth Third Field, the Huntington Center, Imagination Station, and the Maumee riverfront, 43604 is also home to a diverse and dynamic residential population.

Approximately 6,500 live in the 43604 area, with housing ranging from high -rise apartments and converted lofts to the west of our building and subsidized housing developments to the east. It is a racially and ethnically diverse community with 77% of the population single between the ages of 25-50. We plan to further engage with our neighbors in this demographic by offering our building for an indoor garage sale (held May 8), more Party in The Parking lot events (June, July, August), and Friday night "Carols and Cocktails" events in December. We will also participate in a Pride Day booth on Saturday, August 16 and continue to provide water for the Susan G Komen Race on Sunday, Sept 28.



SERVICE LEARNING CAMPS



HeART Gallery will once again host Service Learning Camps for the ELCA. The summer program includes art and faith experiences designed for youth ages 11-16. Groups participate in daily Bible study, a mural walk with guided discussion and reflection, and an "Art Outreach" project. Other activities

include stocking the food bank, working in Toledo community gardens, and helping with local VBS programs. Evenings include a Mud Hens game, outdoor activities and a trip to

Cedar Point for the final day of camp. We look forward to working with these students from several Midwest churches!

NATIVITY FESTIVAL EXPANDS: EXPANDED VENUE,



MORE GUESTS, AND FRESH FESTIVE FEATURES

The annual Nativity Festival is set to return this year with a series of exciting changes designed to welcome more guests and enhance the overall experience. The Arts Committee is discussing ways to accommodate growing crowds and an expanded program of concerts, carol performances, and innovative displays.

Previously most trees and creches were housed in HeART Gallery, but increasing attendance with Friday night artists and music onstage calls for the need to adjust space planning. In response, the Arts Committee is working on a plan to provide room for additional selected attractions and better crowd flow.

This year's musical offerings will include a broader lineup of local ensembles, and guest performers who will bring the spirit of the season to life through both traditional and contemporary carols. Friday evening concerts in the gallery will be led by several local musicians, and include a carol sing-a-long called "Carols and Cocktails", transforming the evening into a more immersive and musical experience for all ages. Mocktails, cocktails and appetizers will be served from 5:30 - 6:30pm during the sing-a-long. Another addition will be Nativi-Tea, which has been held with a max guest list of 120 and a long wait list. Two teas with identical programs will be held to further accommodate guests on Thursday Dec 11 and 18 beginning at 11am. The Nativit-Tea program "Daily Life in Bethlehem" was written by Kate Philabaum and includes a display of 7.5" Fontanini figures. She has been invited to present at the annual convention of Friends of the Creche, to be held in Cleveland, Dec 2-4.

One of the most anticipated changes is the introduction of new display formats in the Resource Room. In addition to the classic nativity scenes, the festival will feature light projections, and congregational art projects that tell the Christmas story in modern, engaging ways. We hope these enhancements will

deepen the message of the Christmas story, while appealing to a wider audience.

"We're excited to make the festival more inclusive, more dynamic, and more memorable. It's not just about making the event bigger, it's about making it better and more meaningful for everyone who attends."

The Nativity Festival will run from December 5th through December 21st on Fridays and Sundays. Midweek tours will be available by appointment. Admission remains free, with donations welcome to support ministries of the Community Heart of Toledo. Nativity crafting, sorting and organizing has begun with weekly work days.

"FROM CRAFT TABLE TO CULINARY TABLE: A POP-UP EXPERIENCE BLENDING ART AND APPETITE"

What happens when creativity spills off the canvas and onto the plate? A one-of-a-kind HeART Gallery event is answering that question fusing the tactile charm of a craft project with the sensory delight of a pop-up chef-style restaurant.

Dubbed "Craft and Crave", guests are invited into a multi-sensory world where hands-on artistry meets high-concept cuisine. Participants begin by engaging in a themed craft activity—perhaps hand -painting ceramic appetizer plates, creating nature - inspired watercolor art pieces, painting

desserts with chocolates, fruits and glazes, or dyeing fabric napkins.

Once the art is made, it's time to eat. Our guest chefs are familiar with the pop-up-style dining experience. Some dishes will be made on-site as guests learn tips in assembling a summer menu. Reservations are limited to 18 for a more personal experience. "Art and food have always gone hand in hand," says HeART Gallery Director Kate Philabaum, who dreamed up the concept while hospitalized with a severe elbow injury. "We wanted to create a night where people could connect—not just with beautiful food, but with their own creativity."

Each event is centered around a theme, such as "Earth & Flame." Guests will create naturaldyed fabric napkins using plant pigments, followed by a meal with some components cooked over an open flame. At each event, chefs will explain the origins of each dish and how it connects to the aesthetic of the craftwork. The July theme "Petals and Palates", will ask guests to explore the delicate beauty of watercolor floral painting and savor a botanicalinspired menu. "Sea and Salt" is the August theme, where guests will sculpt small sea-inspired vessels before enjoying a seafood-forward tasting menu.

The evening encourages slowing down, talking, and appreciating the art of making—from clay to cuisine. Attendees leave with recipes, a piece of art they created, and a renewed appreciation for the creative process.


